For over seven years, Louise battled the ravages of cancer throughout her body. Her determination to remain independent was a motivating factor effectuating her complete cooperation with the excellent medical care she received. These, coupled together, warded off pain and at times the cancer was arrested.

Valiantly she fought about a week against the onslaught of this dreadful disease, finally going to bed on a Thursday. Louise relinquished her earthly cares the following day, Friday, June 24, 1955. She was 49 years of age.

Little did one suspect the mortal battle taking place within her body, for Louise was joyously cheerful and was as "game" as anyone in going along with a joke. With a heart overflowing with love and concern for her family and friends, she had no time to distress others with her personal burdens.

Louise ran Dame Necessity, that mother of invention, a close second when she ingeniously devised a method of following knitting instructions with a crochet hook.
